

Q9 How long have you been making ceramics?




Q10 How long have you fired your work with wood?

Q11 When was the last time you fired/helped to fire the kiln you normally use?











Q27 How many firings would you normally complete or be involved in annually?



Q28 If you don't have your own kiln, do you seek opportunities to fire, or help fire, a wood kiln?





Q35 Do you know the conservation status of the timber species you use to fire your kiln?





Q36 THE FIRINGWhat is the approximate top temperature (°C) you aim for in the kiln you usually fire/help to fire?



Q37 What is the approx. number of hours for a firing in the kiln you are currently firing?








